

2012-2013: The Year in Review

Seattle's longest-running musical organization, Ladies Musical Club (LMC) was founded on March 24, 1891 by a group of 22 professional musicians. Our original mission was to foster an appreciation of classical music in the cultural life of the city. 122 years later, LMC continues as a non-profit organization of approximately 150 women advocating classical music among our members and within our community. In fulfilling our mission, the club touched the lives of children, students and adults in King County and throughout the State more than 18,000 times with 120 different musical offerings in the 2012-2013 season.

Public Concerts

LMC continues its tradition of presenting free classical music performances to the greater Seattle community, which feature member musicians and target both traditional arts audiences and audiences that are either demographically or geographically underserved by classical music. Season highlights included an abridged version of Humperdinck's *Hansel and Gretel* in English, a variety of wonderful wind and string ensembles and

the second annual "Art of Piano" concert at the SAM. Between October and May, 54 free public concerts were presented, reaching over 3,100 people at the Seattle Art Museum (500), the Frye Art Museum (742), the main branch of the Seattle Public Library (480), Mirabella Seattle (640), University House Wallingford (480), St. Dunstan's Episcopal Church (172), the Ballard Odd Fellows Lodge (86), and the West Seattle Library (94). Additionally, a special tribute to Women Composers in October 2012 was warmly received by an appreciative audience of more than 60 music lovers.



Music in Schools Program (MIS)

During the 12-13 school year, The Music in Schools Outreach Program accomplished over 9,400 student contacts with music experiences through eleven different interactive presentations. The six regularly



participating schools were Hawthorne (1425), Highland Park (1587), Maple (2770), Martin Luther King Jr. (1454), Rainier View (992) and Southshore K-8 (1260) elementary schools. Presentations enjoyed by our schools this year included an African American Heritage vocal duo, Conote/Blade folk dancing, Carnival of the Animals piano duet with narration, Six weekly sessions of classroom singing in each of two schools, American Colonial dance with violin accompaniment,

Awards Tour Program

Each year, emerging professional musicians from the six western states compete for substantial cash prizes and recognition in the prestigious Ladies Musical Club competition. In the June 2012 competition there were 17 finalists. Following the competition winners' concert in Seattle each year, they are presented in concerts and school appearances in areas of the state that have limited access to live classical music. This year, all of our winners were also featured in a live broadcast of KING FM's NW Focus Live program.

The state-wide tours took place in September 2012 and reached a total audience of 5,733. The East Solo Tour (winners Iejin Rhee, piano and Jae-In Shin, violin) presented concerts in Yakima, Chelan, and Omak and school visits in Yakima, East Wenatchee, Wenatchee, Entiat, Pateros, Brewster, Omak, Okanogan, and Orovillle. The West Solo Tour (winners Meta Weiss, Cello and Mayumi Tayake, piano) presented concerts in Raymond and Ferndale and school visits in Raymond (students from Raymond, South Bend & Willapa Valley School Districts), Lakewood, Olympia, Aberdeen, Quilcene, Ferndale, Everson, and Sumas. In addition, the Small Ensemble Tour (Puget Sound Saxophone Quartet, winner) presented a recital in Seattle and school visits in Chehalis.
